



The Psychology Club raises awareness for World Mental Health Day

On October 10th, the world comes together to celebrate World Mental Health Day with the purpose of raising awareness of mental health issues and attempt to mobilise efforts in support of mental health. At Virtus, the Psychology Club joined forces to create informative posters on a variety of mental health issues which have the potential to affect students worldwide.

The club members have been exploring and debating about a large spectrum of potential mental health issues that could arise in a Sixth Form environment. Through their research and discussions, they picked out what they decided were the most relevant and important mental health issues that students at Virtus had to be informed about. The issues chosen were: suicide prevention, over-thinking, sleeping disorders, eating disorders, and self-harm. The posters include informative sections to shine a light and raise awareness on these issues. For example, did you know that, according to the American Psychological Association, 17% of the world population will self-harm at least once in their lifetime? These facts are accompanied by tips on prevention and on how you can help yourself and others in need. One of the posters includes the Spanish suicide prevention line number, 024, and others bring attention to platforms and helpful practices like meditation or the supportive eating disorder chat website Alsana.

This great initiative has come to life and anyone can have a read of the posters, which are exposed outside the Head's office. Hopefully, they will have a positive impact and anyone in need will be able to sense the safe environment Virtus is and reach out for help.





Seaspiracy is a 2021 documentary film about the environmental impact of fishing, directed by and starring Ali Tabrizi, a British filmmaker. Seaspiracy was acquired by Netflic in 2020 and released on the platform on March 24th 2021. The duration of Seaspiracy is 1 hour and 29 minutes. It was filmed in various places including Southern Japan, Faroe Islands, West Africa, Thailand, and China.

The film explores environmental issues affecting oceans; including plastic pollution, ghost nets, and overfishing. It argues that commercial fisheries are the main driver of marine ecosystem destruction. The film rejects the concept of sustainable fishing and criticises several marine conservation organisations, including the Earth Island Institute and its dolphin safe label, as well as the sustainable seafood certifications of the Marine Stewardship Council. It also criticises efforts by organisations to reduce household plastic, contrasting their impact with that of ghost nets. It accuses these initiatives of being a cover-up for the environmental impact of fishing and corruption in the fishing industry. Seaspiracy concludes by supporting marine reserves and for ending fish
