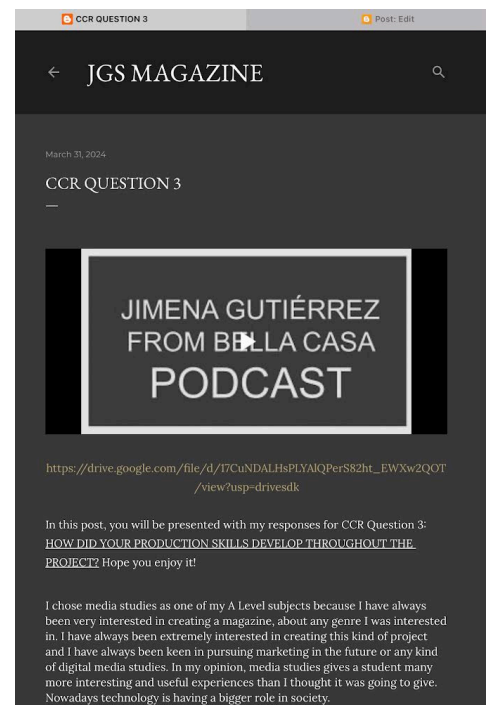
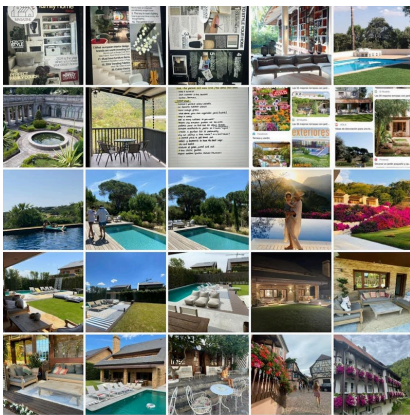

Celebrated on March 8th, International Women's Day (IWD) calls for gender parity while honoring the social, economic, cultural, and political accomplishments of women. Over a million people attended rallies in Austria, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland in 1911 to commemorate the first International Workers' Day (IWD), which had its roots in the labour movements of the early 20th century in both North America and Europe.

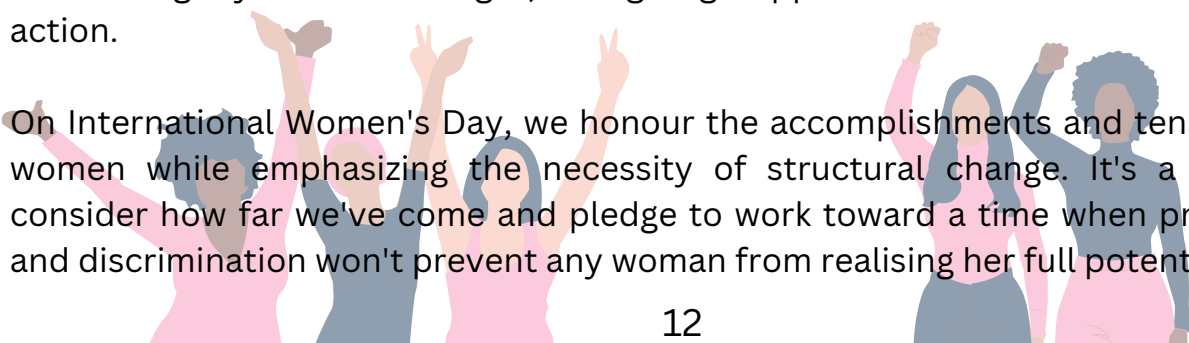
After labour demonstrations in the United States in 1910, the International Socialist Woman's Conference suggested holding an annual Women's Day celebration. IWD gained international recognition in 1975 after the UN declared it to be a day to raise awareness of gender issues. Annual themes, like "DigitALL: Innovation and technology for gender equality" in 2024, represent the objectives and challenges of the present.

Women's rights have advanced significantly in the last century. Today, women have greater access to economic and educational opportunities as well as the ability to vote and work in almost every nation. The Beijing Declaration of 1995 and the 1979 Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) are two significant turning points in history.

Even with advancements, women still deal with problems like the gender pay gap, low representation in leadership positions, and pervasive violence. The COVID-19 pandemic made these disparities worse. In numerous areas, cultural customs and legal limitations still hinder the advancement of women's rights.

In order to achieve gender equality, policies that support economic empowerment, equal pay, and protection from violence are called for, and International Women's Day serves as a reminder of this. Campaigns on social media magnify these messages, energising support worldwide and motivating action.

On International Women's Day, we honour the accomplishments and tenacity of women while emphasizing the necessity of structural change. It's a day to consider how far we've come and pledge to work toward a time when prejudice and discrimination won't prevent any woman from realising her full potential.

Jorge now plays for Adarve FC as an offensive midfielder, after having played in Canillas and was accepted to try out for Real Madrid's academy. Jorge Vega mentioned "Maintaining my good grades is a challenge. I have to organise my time well in order to be able to study and do my homework, on top of going to practices and games. This is a struggle for all student athletes, especially ones doing the A-level which is a very intensive 2 years filled with university applications, mock exams followed by the real ones in May, group projects like he does in his Media Studies class and much more.

Despite this Jorge can maintain his academics to a high level, but accolades aside, and despite not making it into the Real Madrid academy, Jorge remains motivated, disciplined and ambitious for more. His goals for the future are to "get to play on any D1 team and if possible, to play in Real Madrid and represent my country on the national team. I want to win the champions league, and some day, lift the World Cup."

This makes sense as he wants to follow in the footsteps of his footballing idol, an attacking midfielder, Mesut Özil. He said this to say about the retired German midfielder "My inspiration is Mesut Özil. I admire his ability with the ball, his vision of the game and how he gives his all in each match he plays. I want to be as influential on the field as him." Jorge also mentioned that he always loved "passing between the defenders and making a play with my passes. I love creating plays and doling out assists, aside from scoring goals when I get the chance."

One of his goals in academics is to get high enough grades and head off to a great university, but to get high enough grades and have good enough playing ability as a midfielder to go along with a nasty highlight tape of his best plays. Jorge mentioned that he "would like to play football in university if I'm given the chance, in the US ideally, because I think there are many opportunities to improve and many paths that can get me to accomplish my goals and dreams. I think it's a good way of evolving as a player, and simultaneously, getting a great education." Jorge thinks that the US is his best chance at gaining experience and playing at the highest level he can so later in his career he can get to playing football in Europe, representing his country and hopefully being given the honour to be wreathed in a white Real Madrid uniform on the field someday.
